

Word from the Head

Dear Parents,

A brief Word from the Head from me today, at the end of the most extraordinary and wonderful Enrichment Week. Full write-ups of everything that has happened in the week will appear in next week's instalment, with some already included in the second section below, so for now I wanted to share a couple of reflections and thoughts in advance of the final two weeks of term.

It was great to see so many of you cheering on your children at Sports Day on Monday afternoon, and fantastic that the unpredictable, chilly weather of the previous weekend had finally disappeared. I was proud to see such a high level of participation across each year: in every group of girls with whom I chatted, each one had run, jumped or thrown something in support of their House. Without exception each of them said that they had done their best and were happy with their efforts, even when that was a third or fourth place. The afternoon underscored for me the value of these communal events which give everyone, from elite athlete to fun runner, the chance to support their House and their year group, and demonstrate the character and ethos of the school.

I saw more of that character-building out with Year 9 on their practice Duke of Edinburgh's Award walk on Tuesday morning. A big shout out to Team Already Lost, who lived up to their name beautifully in the first hour or so but by the end of the walk had become increasingly confident navigators. At the end of the walk and on the coach home it was great to hear the groups reflecting on their performance on the day and what they would need to do differently over the next two days to complete their assessed expeditions. This is just part of what makes DofE so valuable and I am extremely proud of the high levels of participation at Channing: it's really special.

Also this week Year 7 have been doing all sorts of interesting activities, including making films today, Year 8 have enjoyed their language trips, Year 10 have been immersed in oracy, careers and rollercoasters, Year 12 have made a start on higher education plans. I cannot list everything here as I will undoubtedly miss something out but I would like to record my enormous thanks to all the staff for everything they have done this week. An enormous amount of time and energy has gone into the planning and organisation of this incredible selection of activities and my special thanks to Mrs Bhamra-Burgess for her oversight and masterminding of the whole week. A massive thank you to the colleagues who organised residential trips and those who gave up their time to accompany them; to everyone who led and organised day trips and activities; and to everyone staffing the activities put on. I know your children will have benefited immensely from their efforts.

Now we are back to work for the last two weeks of term, and Monday will bring a return to the classroom and also the last of the exam results. With that in mind, I wanted to share a reminder of how we ask our Channing students to think about these. While we can repeatedly encourage them to care about their performance only in relation to themselves, it is human nature to compare oneself with others - but we all know that's not helpful. If you got 74% and your neighbour got 75%, does that prove anything in the longer term about your relative value as people? Of course it doesn't.

Over the last few years we have been working hard to move away from that view of results and think about them differently, and as parents you have a huge role to play in ensuring that your child has a positive and healthy attitude to what these exams have told them. Because we approach exams, and indeed any kind of assessment, in learning mode rather than performance mode (the latter, of course, being retained solely for the ones that *really* matter in Year 11 and Year 13) it is effort, rather than outcome, which deserves the most praise. Therefore the best questions you could ask about results in the coming week might be: 'What did you discover you know well?' 'Which skills were your strongest?' 'What areas are you going to need to work on next year?' and not (please!) 'What did you get?' and 'What was the highest mark in the class?'. Thank you in advance for your support.

Finally this week, we are thrilled to have received news from Haringey Council that the final planning consent for the redevelopment of Brunner House into our new science and DT building will be granted before the end of term. We have been anticipating this for months and are already prepared to start the first enabling works in the summer holiday. Likewise we have made plans for the coming year and the loss of classrooms that will come along with the first phase of the works. I am pleased to report that, rather than lose our facilities at Stanhope Road or on the Junior School courts to temporary buildings, we have signed a lease for a self-contained block of 6 classrooms at St Aloysius' College on Hornsey Lane. A short walk from school, with its own separate entrance, connected to the Channing WiFi network and brought up to standard by our fabulous estates team over the last couple of months, these classrooms mean that teaching can continue uninterrupted for the duration of the building works. My thanks to timetablers Mrs Williams and Ms Newman for enabling a small number of lessons for every year group to take place on the St Aloysius' site. The move to a new structure of the school day in September, with standard 45 minute periods and 5 minutes of walking time between each lesson, means that the walk around the corner for these lessons will incur no loss of teaching time.

If you did not visit school or the Haringey planning portal to see the plans during the consultation in the Autumn term, I am delighted to say that you'll be able to see all the drawings on display at Founders' Day next Saturday. We are looking forward to welcoming you into school from 9.30am. We will also be hosting a stand for our partner charity, Smart Works, and encourage you to bring a donation of pre-loved work clothing suitable for use by the charity's clients as they embark on their search for a job. You can find out more about their mission <u>here</u> and see the section below for details of exactly what clothing would be most welcome for donation.

Please don't forget that school ends at 12.30pm on Friday 28 June in preparation for Founders' Day the following day, and I look forward to seeing you on Saturday to celebrate the highlights of the school year. For the first time this year's school charity, Smart Works, will be represented and you will be able to speak with our Charity Officers about our fundraising efforts. SmartWorks will accept donations and I would invite you to read on for details below.

For now, let me wish Eid Mubarak to our families who celebrated Eid-UI-Adha earlier in the week and a happy Summer Solstice to those celebrating the festival of Midsummer.

Enrichment Week News

Talk the Talk

Year 10 pupils attended a talk by the author and activist Laura Bates followed by oracy workshops run by the organisation Talk the Talk at St Aloysius school. Thirty St Aloysius pupils joined them for the day. Laura Bates's talk focused on the power of storytelling to challenge gender stereotypes and her own new young-adult novel Sisters of Sword and Shadow (available to buy at the discounted price of £8.00 from the <u>Children's Bookshop</u> in Muswell Hill - just mention you are from Channing). Also in the workshops, pupils completed the 'Talk About Communication' workshop which was an exciting and engaging master class developing speaking and listening



skills. The workshop provided numerous speaking opportunities and students were coached and supported throughout the day to deliver a structured two minute presentation on a topic for which they had a genuine passion, to their peers.

Pupil Testimony:

On Wednesday, Year 10 Channing and St Aloysius students had the opportunity to participate in a range of activities related to careers and oracy. The day began with a talk from the author Laura Bates, the founder of the Everyday Sexism Project (https://everydaysexism.com/). She explained the immense impact that the stories that we are subjected to from birth have on our stereotypes, and how discriminative reporting in newspapers and magazines can prevent women from aspiring to be in positions of political power, furthering the problem. This is what led Bates to creating her website: a platform for people all over the world to share their experiences with sexism. With her project having grown into a global movement, she has been able to use the stories shared by individuals in parliament, schools, and the White House, amongst many other places, to change school curriculums and to tackle the way in which we respond to discrimination internationally.

After reflecting upon the books that shaped her childhood, Laura was inspired to write her debut fantasy novel, Sisters of Sword and Shadow, to change the mindsets of young people around the world. Her book tells the story of Cass, a seventeen-year-old girl living in Arthurian England rebelling against a society where gender roles are rigidly enforced.

In the afternoon, students took part in a workshop run by 'Talk the Talk', an organisation specialised in teaching effective communication skills for success in both personal and professional spheres. We learnt a variety of vocal, visual and verbal techniques for clear and compelling public speaking: for example, we were shown the importance of eye contact and hand gestures, as well as using both anecdotes and facts to engage listeners. Another main focus of the workshop was on actively listening and providing and receiving supportive feedback to improve our skills. Working in groups, we met new people and worked together to give constructive feedback to our peers.

A huge thank you to all the teachers and staff involved in organising these events; we thoroughly enjoyed the day and we learnt many invaluable skills that will undoubtedly benefit us in the future!
